## Traffic Lights: an update

Following last month's report about a hoped for police presence at our lights, LHPC can now offer some good news. After a meeting with Chief Inspector McDonald at Hertford Police station, LHPC has been promised a regular police presence to enforce the law at the lights. This will encompass all illegal driving activities and CI McDonald and his Safer Neighbourhood Team have said that all drivers carrying out illegal practices will be issued with a ticket. This will be part of Operation Callback, instigated by David Lloyd, our county Police and Crime Commissioner.

The police presence has come about by a campaign by LHPC and local residents and shows how seriously the police are taking our campaign to make the lights a safer area. LHPC no longer require residents to report illegal driving at the lights. However, as a resident of the community you are still free to do so in much the same way you would if you were a witness to any other form of crime. The police response to this campaign has been partly brought about by a regular flow of emails detailing cars that have been witnessed overtaking at the lights. With police resources stretched, it often falls to the local community to begin the data collecting process of both queue jumping and speeding vehicles. In response to the letter of last month from Mr John Welsh, LHPC realise that if we wish to slow the traffic down through our village then we need to collect information of how many speeding vehicles travel through Little Hadham. Only then, when enough data is gathered, will the police make a decision as to whether it is worth their while setting up a speed trap. LHPC appreciates Mr John Welsh's view but feel that the safety of all is paramount and only by gathering information will we receive the required support from the police.

Many thanks to all who have emailed LHPC with their suggestions regarding the lights. The Parish Council have been in consultation with Herts Highways regarding the timing and sequence of the lights over the previous 5+ years and their reply is based on the following thinking. If just 20 seconds were added to the lights being green on each our two side roads a larger build-up of traffic would occur on the A120. This in turn would lead to an increase in rat running through Albury and Upwick Green to the north and Bury Green and Westland Green to the south. Some of these vehicles would then end up at the lights, thereby nullifying the extra timing on the sequence. Although the lights may be the cause for queue jumping etc there is little we can do to change the sequence and so it comes down to both education and enforcement to stop the potentially lethal practice of overtaking stationary vehicles that are abiding by the law. Once the police have gathered enough information, another meeting will be convened and we shall then look into what technology may be employed to make the lights a safe area to cross.

## Little Hadham & Albury Social Club

Unfortunately the foggy weather and possible other Christmas activities meant we had a small number at our December meeting. Stacey Johnson of the 'Kisses4Kids Charity' told us how she decided to help children in hospital long term stay and possibly with terminal illnesses, as when she was also hospitalised long term as a little girl there was nothing for children to do to entertain themselves. She and her family started fund raising and have created leisure areas in the Princess Alexandra Hospital and the Lister Hospital. They now have their own website [www.kisses4kids.org.uk](http://www.kisses4kids.org.uk) which gives information of how you can donate and/or help the charity. Stacey continues to fight her own battle against illness, supported by her family. Three years ago she was chosen as a Community Champion by the Herts. & Essex Newspaper Group and carried the Olympic torch in the run up to the Olympic Games – what an amazing example of making success out of adversity.

Sadly, Bob Sewell died on 8th December, he had celebrated his 94th birthday on 5th. He had been in hospital for some time. At the farewell party held in the Village Hall, Bob had said that living in Little Hadham had been the best part of their lives. Our thoughts are with Pam and their family.

## Easton Lodge 2013 Group Visits

The historic Gardens of Easton Lodge date back over 400 years. Their most renowned owner was the Countess of Warwick, mistress of The Prince of Wales, later Edward VII. In 1902 she commissioned leading landscape garden designer Harold Peto to create stunning formal gardens. Abandoned in 1950 after the demolition of the house the gardens were forgotten for nearly 45 years. In 1993 an ambitious restoration programme was started. Today the gardens have a magical atmosphere, as the splendour of a century ago is gently revealed, allowing the visitor to imagine their past glories and enjoy their tranquil present.

Previously only accessible on 9 public open days each year, we are delighted to announce that starting from March 2013 we will be offering groups\* the opportunity to visit parts of the Gardens on Thursdays throughout the year.

Visits will last approximately 2 hours and the cost of £5 per person will cover:

The final report of the year, written on a fine, bright day following a period of bitter cold and one of the most amazing hoar frost mornings I have encountered for many a year (13.12.12) A long walk around the parish on the 11th Dec. showed there to be very little food in the hedgerows, in the form of berries, seeds and nuts and consequently, few birds. A week previously I had spent a good time studying a large finch and bunting flock near Millfield Lane. This flock consisted of over 50 goldfinches, 8 bullfinches, 25 yellowhammers, 2 reed buntings and numerous greenfinches and chaffinches. However, by the 11th they had all moved on.

A walk to Much Hadham on the 16th gave great views of both nuthatch and treecreeper, with a nuthatch taking up residence in our garden, using the feeder continually as shown here. Although I have searched all areas that could be inhabited by waxwings and bramblings, I have yet to come across any in our locality. A party of at least 6 waxwings was encountered in Hertford, feeding on berries right outside a house. Suspect the residents were becoming rather fed up with continual photographers outside their home taking photos of their rare visitors. Photo overleaf of one particularly confiding bird.

Other notable birds were discovered around Hadham Hall, with the pair of barn owls feeding

### **Bite sized gardening** – useful definitions:

*Annual:* - Plant that germinates, flowers and dies within a year.

*Biennial:* - Plant grown from a seed whose life cycle normally spans two years. It develops a leafy tuft or rosette the first year and flowers, seeds and dies in the second year.

*Perennial:* - Plant that lives for several years.

*Tender:* - Used to describe plants that a) are injured by frost or cold weather and b) can only be grown in a greenhouse or with protection in a given climate.

*Hardy:* - Describes a plant surviving outdoors in a given climate zone. Generally implies that it has some frost resistance.

*Half-hardy:* - Describes plants which only survive limited cold or very light frost unless in a protected site or situation.

# TRAFFIC LIGHTS!

## Letter 1.

*While taking my children to school I witnessed yet another incident of dangerous 'red light jumping' while stopped at a red light. 3 cars were ahead of me as I approached the red traffic lights on Albury Rd. The car immediately in front of me, (black Audi convertible), then quickly pulled out of the line of cars and turned left onto the A120 towards Bishop's Stortford.*

*While this is the first of these incidents that I have reported, it is behaviour I see regularly.*

*Local children attending Little Hadham primary school, and senior school children using the buses use their knowledge of the lights sequence to enable them to cross the road in either direction safely. While primary age children mostly have an adult with them, the senior school children are usually on their own.*

*I am concerned that it is only a matter of time before there is a serious accident.*

## Letter 2.

*Road safety is of course paramount. I speak as a Parent whose Son was knocked down by a car outside his school a few years ago – St. Andrews, Much Hadham. Fortunately, the driver was one of the very few who actually stick to 30mph and below when going through a 30mph zone and the injuries were very minor. I fear that one day someone will be run over on the Albury road by one of the many vehicles that travel at well over 30mph to make the lights. The speeds at which some of the very large lorries come down the Albury road is scary! I would like to see the Police do something about that as well.*

*Why do people speed up to the lights and why do so many go through at red and overtake others? There are of course no excuses, but dealing with the cause may lead to less offences. The delays (village sides) at the lights can be very long and a fairer approach to village traffic is needed. I have been in regular contact with Highways over the years about the sequence of the lights which obviously is very time biased in favour of the A120 traffic. It sounds very dull, but I have on numerous occasions timed the sequence between Green lights on the Albury Road and at peak hours it can be as much as 5 minutes. This means that sometimes people (including us) can be sat at the lights for up to 10 minutes if the queue is long which it often is.*

*Can we create a solution that is fairer for the residents of the village whilst we wait for that elusive by pass?*

at dawn and dusk, a large party of all male tufted duck and the resident little grebes, whilst over at Ash Valley Golf Course a lone meadow pipit was seen, along with 3 common gulls. Both of these are not regular visitors to our parish. In our garden regular visitors to the feeders include great, long tailed, blue and coal tits as well as the usual finches, great spotted woodpecker, the ubiquitous jackdaws and an occasional female sparrow hawk.



The latter makes rapid, low level attacks on the collared doves, usually early in the morning and its presence is invariably given away by all the birds immediately taking to the air.

Amazingly, on the 16th Dec, a small tortoiseshell butterfly was encountered along the footpath to Much Hadham. This alighted in leaf litter before heading off north. By far the latest I have recorded this species of butterfly within the parish.



So, I still await an encounter with a Scandinavian rarity in our village, but with the forecast being favourable over the next fortnight I may well be writing of such a find in the New Year.

Finally, wishing all readers a Very Peaceful New Year and hope that the coming year brings happiness to all. I sign off 2012 with a most relaxing photo of an oak tree, taken during the snowy period in early December between Albury and Hadham Ash.
